Letter From The President

Happy Summer!

Come on out and join us for our 8th Annual Greyt Walkathon on July 28th!! The Walkathon is our biggest fundraiser of the year and we need to raise over \$30,000 this year to help meet expenses. Register on-line at www.greytwalkathon.org. If you can't walk, please consider sponsoring someone who is or making a general donation. If you have a business, please consider being a sponsor for the Walkathon. \$250 gets your logo on the back of the Walkathon shirts and exposure on our social media accounts and at the Walkathon. We need you so we can help the dogs!

For those of you that follow greyhound racing, you are most probably asking whether GPI can continue to find greyhounds that need our help in finding their forever homes. Our mission is these dogs and we are working hard to find greyhounds that need us.

As additional race tracks are closing around the country, it is becoming increasingly difficult to find and transport retired racers to the Pacific Northwest. Many of the retired racers are on the east coast of the USA and haulers want a minimum number of dogs to make it worthwhile for them to transport dogs all the way to the Pacific Northwest. Working with our sources and with some creativity, we have been able to keep the kennel full and the dogs coming in to the GPI. At the same time we are expanding our outreach to find greyhounds and greyhound mixes throughout the USA and overseas that need help in finding their forever homes. As well as the retired racers from the USA and Ireland, we are also bringing in greyhound mixes from the mid-west, South Korea, and the UAE. We have put our name on the list of groups willing to take greyhounds when the track in Macau (China) closes this July. We remain hopeful that the Macau track will release the dogs to adoption groups.

The transport of dogs that need to be flown remains a challenge. Airline restrictions and changes in policy are making the transport of large dogs challenging, but we are continuing to work on solutions and alternatives.

For those of you that have been following Shadow and the treatment of her IMHA (Immune Mediated Hemolytic Anemia), we are at the point where she is off all medications. She has had one follow up blood test, since ending her medications, with good results. We now need to wait until the end of June and do another follow up blood test. Keep your fingers crossed, but we are hopeful that the results will be good. Shadow certainly seems to be feeling fine and is fun, playful and happy!! Thank you to everyone who has helped and is helping with her medical expenses.

We continue to battle against the dreaded hookworm, especially with those dogs that come to us from Florida. If your vet tells you only to give three (3) days of Panacur and do nothing else, please contact us for more information. Many vets are not familiar with how persistent these South-eastern hookworm are and the vigorous and persistent attack that needs to be done to rid your pup of these critters.

Certainly this rings true for our volunteer Donna Gonder. Donna has been dedicating her time to GPI since 2010; a key contributor not only to our GPI organization, but several animal sanctuaries throughout the Northwest. From the Chimpanzee Sanctuary Northwest in Roslyn to a Pigs Peace Sanctuary in Seattle, she has devoted her mission in life to watching out for others. More recently Donna has worked with PAWS, where she has provided on call transport to wild animals. I was anxious to delve into her unique volunteer opportunities at these organizations, but first wanted to learn more about this busy lady, and how this all began.



Donna grew up in Renton, and as we talk she discloses she “always always always had a pet”. “I was one of those kids who constantly brought home animals”. She chuckles and explains that not only did she bring home the 3 cats that the family kept as pets, but she would often bring home her playmates or young friends she had met. Curious as to what her parent’s would say when she brought home a new friend, and why she did it, Donna attributed it to growing up in a big family of five brothers and a sister, “so why not another one?”

Spending most of her life in Washington, she did have the opportunity to live a year and half in neighboring Alaska, where at a young 18 she bravely ventured to an area 22 miles out of town, living in a log cabins with no running water or heat, just a wood stove. Living right off the inlet, she would often climb up the pastures, encountering many wild animals including moose and Dahl sheep. I was not familiar with the breed and Donna clarified for me “They are the ones with the big hooked horns.”

She soon moved back to the area she loved and had grown up in and became acquainted with GPI through her friend Rita Laws.

Rita, who was a volunteer with GPI at the time, contacted Donna one day during the holiday time. This was not unusual because Rita and Donna had a tradition of donated their time around the holidays volunteering. Rita had discovered through her volunteering with GPI that they were short of help during the holiday season. She asked Donna if she’d like to come in and just two weeks after Donna’s first volunteer event, Rita asked again. She knew then that matching Donna with GPI was no accident, and for us at GPI, our good fortune.

Donna’s volunteer time is every Sunday as Kennel help. She comes in for cleaning, feeding and medicating. Although she is trained to do lead kennel, she usually works with a lead person on call. One of her favorite things to do while she is volunteering? Washing dishes! Her creative nature often catches up with her and she says “she likes to make art out of miscellaneous items”. If you have ever come in after she has done the dishes you will enjoy her handiwork. She enjoys joining up on Brightwater walks when she can, and her delicious baked goods are a part of our GPI fundraising events. Donna alters her recipes to her Vegan baking techniques. Once again her creativity at work in her baking.

As if her many hours of helping is not busy enough, Donna enjoys making jewelry in her “spare” time. Ever the enthusiastic participant, Donna’s sister-in-law got her involved in making elastic bracelets with beads, which later emerged into her interest in taking wire wrapping classes. When a friend was looking for a wedding necklace and earrings and couldn’t find exactly what her ideal piece would be, Donna created a remembrance piece consisting of 300 crystals. “She was a beautiful bride”, Donna remarked.

The bride wore an exquisite A-Line simple dress and then matched it to a adorned necklace which was just the “bling” needed to complete her beautiful wedding ensemble. How wonderful to be able to share her talents with others.



I wanted to hear all about Donna's volunteer experiences and she explained how different each one has been, and yet how they have surely lead her to her work at GPI. With chimpanzees you cannot “love on them”, she explained, yet you feel the connection with them as you are around them and get to know them. By helping on many projects to better their environment, you feel you are making an impact, just not a physical connection.

I was curious about her transporting wild life, and asked if she handles the animals she transports. Yes, she often handles the animals. Small baby birds arrive that may have to be converted from a box they were brought into to a warm container for transport. Volunteers sign up at the beginning of the month and are considered on-call. She uses her own car and has learned unique methods for keeping baby animals warm and content. She related how baby animals have a hard time regulating temperatures, and how she has used warm packs under the blankets for transport of animals. Often baby birds,

but raccoons, wild turkeys and even a Perigrine falcon have been passengers in Donna's care. I was in awe at the idea of being in close contact with a Perigrine Falcon and wanted to hear more of the details. “It was sort of scary” Donna stated “and intimidating.” When they began their car ride the falcon was very quiet and then, all of a sudden, at a stop light it let out the Perigrine call. She said it sounds like a shrill screech. The cars around her were looking at where it was coming from. Google it sometime, I did. I cannot imagine how amazing it would have been to hear that inside your vehicle. She has also learned some interesting things about animals indicative to our Northwest region. Did you know there is a green heron? Not just a blue heron. You never know what you might learn and what opportunities are waiting for your volunteer career.



These days Donna shares her home with her 3 dogs, Sandy, Logan and Sparky and her cat Tiger. This busy lady also works a full time job in a Seattle commercial Management Company, which she has been a part of for the past 2 years.



I wonder and am often surprised at what motivates people to do good work. There are books that try to capture it, seminars that teach us how to do it, but in the end perhaps it is just how it makes us feel as a person, by doing for others. This resonates so clearly when I talk with Donna.

Greyhound Dental Care - By Dr. Lesley Kovar, DVM

As veterinarians, we recognize that pet dental care and oral health are essential to overall wellness. A recent study showed that by 3 years of age, 80% of dogs have some form of periodontal disease. Greyhounds in particular are notorious for having "bad teeth." This has been attributed to the diet fed at the tracks, but more likely it is due to a genetic predisposition to periodontal disease.

Before explaining how we treat and prevent dental conditions, it is helpful to understand progression of the disease. It all starts with plaque, a sticky bacteria-containing biofilm that forms within hours after the teeth have been cleaned. As plaque mixes with minerals in saliva, tartar (or calculus) develops as a hard deposit over just days. Gingivitis, inflammation of the gums, ensues. Ultimately the structures that support the tooth become infected and inflamed, leading to periodontitis. The progressive nature of periodontal disease results in bone loss, abscessed teeth, oral pain, and potential for systemic disease.

Dogs, especially greyhounds, are quite stoic and do not necessarily tell us that they are in pain. Therefore, we often have to look closely for indications of oral and periodontal disease. Signs include halitosis (bad breath), difficulty in chewing, excessive drooling, and bleeding. Get in the habit of looking in your dog's mouth, lifting the lips and inspecting the teeth and gums. Make note of inflamed areas and accumulation of tartar.

There is much involved when your pet has a "dental cleaning." The correct term for the procedure is a COHAT (complete oral health assessment and treatment) or APT (assessment, plan, and treatment). Obviously, it begins with ensuring the pet is healthy for anesthesia. Then it is anesthetized and maintained on an inhalant gas administered through an endotracheal tube. Monitoring equipment is hooked up to monitor vital body functions. Dental radiographs are taken, ideally of the entire mouth, in order to evaluate the health of the roots and the extent of periodontal disease. Tartar is removed with special instruments and ultrasonic scaling. Root planning is performed, with the roots being scaled beneath the gum line. The tooth surface is polished with a gritty paste to smooth out any enamel scratches made during the cleaning. The periodontal sockets are probed and charted in the record for future reference. Then the veterinarian evaluates the radiographs and examines the teeth, deciding if any extractions are indicated. We look for abnormalities such as significant bone loss, root abscesses, root exposure, and fractures. Removal of teeth can be quite complicated, involving precise surgical techniques and prolonged anesthesia. Once complete, the mouth is disinfected and the pet is allowed to recover from anesthesia. Any potential pain is addressed intraoperatively with nerve blocks, and post operatively with anti-inflammatories, with stronger drugs if deemed necessary.

It is possible that you have heard of anesthesia-free dental cleanings. This procedure is quite controversial, and disapproved of by the veterinary dental specialists. It involves hand scaling the teeth in an awake patient. Although the teeth will appear whiter, it is deceiving because of the inability to clean under the gums (this is where periodontal disease progresses). Many of the issues we see in greyhound mouths are only detectable under anesthesia and with dental radiographs. In fact, greater than 60% of periodontal disease occurs under the gum line. Also, there is considerable potential for injury, either from prolonged restraint or slippage of instruments.

There is a condition in dogs called chronic contact mucositis or CUPS (chronic ulcerative paradental stomatitis), and unfortunately believed to be caused by a hypersensitivity to bacteria in plaque. The gingiva becomes markedly inflamed and "kissing ulcers" form on the inner lips where they contact the crowns of the teeth. This disease is painful and extremely difficult to control. A complete dental cleaning is performed and meticulous home care, involving daily tooth brushing, is required. More often than not, full mouth tooth extractions are necessary to eliminate the inflammation.

Once the teeth are clean, diligent home care is advised to maintain good oral health. Ideally, the teeth are brushed daily to prevent plaque from adhering, but even twice a week will help keep tartar from forming. A toothpaste specific for pets should be used, as human products are not meant to be swallowed. Many types of brushes are available and effective. I personally use a battery operated children's model on my pets, which is tolerated quite well. The key to success is to start slow to get your pet used to brushing, and there are many online videos that demonstrate techniques. If tooth brushing is not feasible, the next best thing is dental wipes. Using one daily will remove much plaque from the tooth crown (but not in the crevices and spaces between teeth). There are also dental sprays and rinses that can remove bacteria, as well as dental treats and diets formulated to help remove buildup. Try to use a product that has the VOHC (Veterinary Oral Health Council, see a list at VOHC.org) seal of acceptance. This organization evaluates products to make sure they will control plaque and tartar. Bones, hooves, antlers, and other hard objects are not recommended for chewing, as they frequently cause tooth fractures. There is the "knee cap rule," coined by Fraser Hale, a prominent veterinary dentist, that says if you don't want your knee cap hit with it, do not let your dog chew on it.

The adage that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of care" is certainly applicable to oral health in our pets. As with us humans, it is easier to prevent a disease than to cure it. Keeping your dog's mouth healthy will help to keep him/her living a longer, happier, more comfortable life!

- Call the GPI toll free number IMMEDIATELY!! 877-468-7681 (enter us as a contact in your cell phone). We will get a search party organized, post it on our website and social media pages, and alert folks your dog is missing
- Take a squawker (available at the GPI Rootique) and your CELL PHONE with you when you start your search. If your home phone number is on your dog's tags, make sure someone is available at that number as well in case a good Samaritan finds your pup.
- Have a Missing Dog flyer with your dog's picture on your computer ready to print and post at a moment's notice.



~ **Why is a collar and GPI tag important?** If your greyhound gets lost, the toll free number can be called and we can help get your dog back to you faster. Plus, if you've moved and haven't updated your phone/address tag, then GPI's toll free number could be the only way your greyhound is safely returned to you. Without a collar and ID tags, it is much harder to locate and reunite you. Please keep your dog's tags current and update GPI about any phone or address changes.

If you don't like the sound of the tags jingling, try a tag bag, an elastic band around the tags, or some of the rubber bumpers for keys around each tag. But please do not leave your dog without a collar and tags. Your dog's life may depend upon those tags.

All current GPI dogs are microchipped and registered to GPI, as a backup safety net, but if found, someone has to get the dog to a place that can read the microchip before we can try and reunite you and your dog.



Super Simple Sweet Potato Dog Treats

Ingredients:


- 1 sweet potato
- 2 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
- 1/4 cup unsweetened applesauce
- 2 eggs

Directions:

- 1) Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- 2) Prick sweet potato several times with a fork. Heat sweet potato in a microwave on high until tender, about 6 minutes. Cut potato in half and scoop flesh out of the skin into a bowl; discard skin. Mash potato with a fork or potato masher and transfer about 1 cup to a large bowl. Save any remaining sweet potato for another use.
- 3) Mix whole wheat flour, applesauce, and eggs in the large bowl with the sweet potato until a dough forms. Turn dough out on a well-floured surface and roll dough to about 1/2-inch thick. Cut out shapes using a cookie cutter or cut dough into strips with a pizza cutter. Arrange cookies on an ungreased baking sheet.
- 4) Bake until crisp, 35 to 45 minutes. Cool in the pans for 10 minutes before removing to cool completely on a wire rack.


